Phonics

Throughout Key Stage 1, children should use their developing phonics skills to help them decode unfamiliar words. By the end of Year 1, children should be confident with applying sounds from Phase 2-5.

As children progress throughout Key Stage 1, they will rely less on sounding words out as they begin to recognise them on sight. This will improve their fluency and pace in preparation for Key Stage 2.

How can I help with my **Phonics** child's phonics at home?

- Highlight sounds to help break the words down.

Developing comprehension


Along with the important skill of developing decoding and fluency skills, children are also assessed in their understanding of what they are reading.

We use **Reading Vipers** to help develop their comprehension skills. Reading vipers breaks down comprehension skills into key areas.

Key questions that link to each of these areas can be found on the separate Reading Vipers overview. These questions are great to use for when you are reading at home with your child.
